JHS Mill Levy Fact Sheet 2012

- We have maintained a fairly stable enrollment while many schools in our area are dropping enrollment numbers.
 We believe this is due to our fantastic staff and innovative, award winning programs.
- Per OPI our largest budget with a vote is \$1,875,681.43. We are asking for \$48,466.73 in order to fund our school at current staffing and program levels.
- Why not \$80,000 as originally mentioned?
- The lawsuit against the State resulted in additional monies of ~\$11,000 when the State lost—an increase in our percentage from 1.6% to 2.43%.
- 2 retirements of long time staff allow us a partial cost savings on their replacements due to those 2 staff's longevity at our school. Simply, new staff won't likely be at the "top" of the pay scale—saving us about \$20,000.
- We have not been able to collect Montana Tunnels' portion of our tax base as they have not paid taxes for since 2009 and we have to plan for the probable circumstance that those monies are not forthcoming.
- Due to our levy failing last year we exhausted our flex fund (a one-time fund) and our Indian Education fund (a one time fund) to keep our Art curriculum at status quo. We do not have general fund "pots" or "pockets" of cash and by law we cannot hold more than a 10% reserve—we have to spend the money we budget.
- We realize the economic status of our district has been better. We are asking for \$4.79 per 100,000 market value on a home. See pictures of homes and corresponding tax.



Boulder \$114,900 will cost approximately \$5.50 in taxes



Clancy \$260,000 will cost approximately \$12.45 in taxes.



MT City \$360,000 will cost approximately \$17.23 in taxes.

Bullying/Harassment/Intimidation/Hazing

The Board will strive to provide a positive and productive learning and working environment. Bullying, harassment, intimidation, or hazing, by students, staff, or third parties, is strictly prohibited and shall not be tolerated. This includes bullying, harassment, or intimidation via electronic communication devices ("cyberbullying").

Definitions

- 1. "Third parties" include but are not limited to coaches, school volunteers, parents, school visitors, service contractors or others engaged in District business, such as employees of businesses or organizations participating in cooperative work programs with the District, and others not directly subject to District control at inter-district and intra-District athletic competitions or other school events.
- 20 2. "District" includes District facilities, District premises, and non-District property if the student or employee is at any District-sponsored, District-approved, or District-related activity or function, such as field trips or athletic events, where students are under the control of the District or where the employee is engaged in District business.
 - 3. "Hazing" includes but is not limited to any act that recklessly or intentionally endangers the mental or physical health or safety of a student for the purpose of initiation or as a condition or precondition of attaining membership in or affiliation with any District-sponsored activity or grade-level attainment, including but not limited to forced consumption of any drink, alcoholic beverage, drug, or controlled substance, forced exposure to the elements, forced prolonged exclusion from social contact, sleep deprivation, or any other forced activity that could adversely affect the mental or physical health or safety of a student; requires, encourages, authorizes, or permits another to be subject to wearing or carrying any obscene or physically burdensome article, assignment of pranks to be performed, or other such activities intended to degrade or humiliate.
 - 4. "Harassment, intimidation, or bullying" means any act that substantially interferes with a student's educational benefits, opportunities, or performance, that takes place on or immediately adjacent to school grounds, at any school-sponsored activity, on school-provided transportation, at any official school bus stop, or anywhere conduct may reasonably be considered to be a threat or an attempted intimidation of a student or staff member or an interference with school purposes or an educational function, and that has the effect of:
 - Physically harming a student or damaging a student's property;
 - Knowingly placing a student in reasonable fear of physical harm to the student or damage to the student's property.
 - c. Creating a hostile educational environment.
- 5. "Electronic communication device" means any mode of electronic communication, including, but not limited to, computers, cell phones, PDAs, or the internet.

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Reporting

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All complaints about behavior that may violate this policy shall be promptly investigated. Any student, employee, or third party who has knowledge of conduct in violation of this policy or feels he/she · requirec has been a victim of hazing, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in violation of this policy is encouraged to immediately report his/her concerns to the building principal or the District Administrator, who have overall responsibility for such investigations. A student may also report concerns to a teacher or counselor, who will be responsible for notifying the appropriate District official. Complaints against the building principal shall be filed with the Superintendent. Complaints against the Superintendent or District Administrator shall be filed with the Board.

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The complainant shall be notified of the findings of the investigation and, as appropriate, that remedial action has been taken.

Add: The guideance courser will be notified to meet with the victim Responsibilities to make sure helshe is not being builted by another student.

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The District Administrator shall be responsible for ensuring notice of this policy is provided to students, staff, and third parties and for the development of administrative regulations, including reporting and investigative procedures, as needed.

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Consequences

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Students whose behavior is found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to discipline up to and including expulsion. Staff whose behavior is found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to discipline up to and including dismissal. Third parties whose behavior is found to be in violation of this policy shall be subject to appropriate sanctions as determined and imposed by the District Administrator or the Board. Individuals may also be referred to law enforcement officials.

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Retaliation and Reprisal

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Retaliation is prohibited against any person who reports or is thought to have reported a violation, files a complaint, or otherwise participates in an investigation or inquiry. Such retaliation shall be considered a serious violation of Board policy, whether or not a complaint is substantiated. False charges shall also be regarded as a serious offense and will result in disciplinary action or other appropriate sanctions.

Once again, Jefferson County is in need of your support for work to be done on the Cataract Creek Road Bridge over Cataract Creek (a.k.a. Saturday Night Bridge), and the Dunn Lane Bridge over the Boulder River.

In 2010 you sent a support letter for the Dunn Lane Bridge. However, it was withdrawn from the last Treasure State Endowment Program (TSEP) cycle and must be resubmitted for consideration in the upcoming 2012 grant process. With successful funding the work to be done on these two bridges would tentatively begin sometime in 2013.

Jefferson County has been working in conjunction with TSEP since 2006 to make the Bridge network in our County safe and reliable through structural integrity.
